#### A TRIBUTE TO ROBERT WAGNER

For several years, I have had the privilege to visit Robert Wagner regularly. At 100 years and two months, Robert died on Veterans Day, November 10. It was fitting that this World War II veteran entered eternity with Christ on that day. This humble Soldier was wounded three times during intense fighting in France and Germany. As a retired Army chaplain, I felt a close kinship with Robert... a brotherhood with a man who remembered details of his months in Europe as the Allies fought and defeated Hitler's military.

Robert was baptized and confirmed at Concordia Lutheran Church. He was one of a handful of members over 100 years old. When I first began making visits on members who cannot always get to church, Robert was the first one I visited and communed. I spent an hour listening to his stories on that first visit. When he was young, he played semi-pro baseball locally. One of his infield teammates was a young man named Harold Carabina. An old newspaper Robert showed me has both him and Harold completing a double play. Harold was later known as Harry Caray.

I was struck by his vivid memories of time spent in the Army. He recalled the battlefield commission when one day he was a corporal, the next day a lieutenant. That happened frequently when officers were killed or wounded and needed to be replaced. I suspect that due to Corporal Wagner's intelligence and leadership ability, he was an easy choice to fill the vacancy.

According to Robert, one of his Purple Hearts was for injuries sustained due to "friendly fire," an oxymoron if there ever was one. He survived the war and returned home to his wife, Betty. He worked for 40 years for Southwestern Bell AT&T and lived in Kirkwood all his life. His sense of humor, his love for God and Country, and his quiet confidence were always evident. I was privileged to have known this hero and will miss him greatly until our reunion in heaven.
